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

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

COLOR DEMONSTRATION GIVEN BEFORE LIONS CLUB TUESDAY NIGHT

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Miss Elizabeth Spooner and Miss Mae Jorgensen, both members of the Evansville 4-H club, presented a demonstration, "Color and How We Use It," at the regular meeting of the Lions club held Tuesday night in the Hotel Central.

The demonstration team won honors at both the Rock county 4-H fair and the Wisconsin State fair last fall. The state honor entitled the participants to a free trip to the National 4-H club congress held last month in Chicago.

Before starting their demonstration Tuesday night, the girls, both attired in white, each gave an introductory address. Miss Jorgensen explained that color is such an important factor in our daily lives that we even speak it. "We speak of dull, gray days, dark days, and blue days," she said. "We need colors to make us happy. Colors, like music, play a more important part in our lives today than formerly. Even Helen Keller has a definite idea of color."

In her address, Miss Spooner explained that color has three qualities; namely, hue, value and intensity. "There are four special ways of combining colors" she said. They are, using opposite colors for harmony, color to express warmth, color to express coolness, and a small amount of bright color to balance a large amount of dull or greyed color.

In presenting their demonstration the girls used a glass dish half full of water upon which they spread certain combinations of colors. On the surface of this they placed a sheet of paper which c was marblized according to the colors spread on the surface of the water. Following the demonstration they explained the practical uses of the paper which can be used for covering book ends, book binders, letter holders, hat stands, waste paper baskets, and lamp shades.
