SHOP COMRADES COME TO RESCUE

Baker Shop Boys Give Skin From
Arms to Help Burned Comrade.
20 Volunteer in Skin Grafting.

SUCCESSFUL OPERATION - IN-
SURES QUICK RECOVERY.

The burns of Calvin Powers, of this city, resulting from the bursting of a flask of molten metal at the Baker Manufacturing Co. plant, some time ago, have proven worse than first suspected and it has been found necessary to aid nature by grafting new skin on the burns in order to make them heal.

In order that this might be accomplished, twenty of his shop comrades last Sunday volunteered to furnish the new skin necessary to transplant on the burns. A small piece of skin was taken from the arm of each one and transplanted on to the burns, thus insuring their healing. The operation took place at the Dr. Smith hospital last Sunday morning, and was a success in every particular.
