A special guest was Lowell Thompson, who is the father of Mrs. Duane Ahlf of Evansville. Mr. Thompson is a resident at Continental Manor here.

Mr. Thompson, who was the recipient of Scouting's highest award, the Lamb Award in 1971, became affiliated with Scouts in 1936 in Racine. He was a scoutmaster for 10 years and served as camp director and served at the National Scout Jamboree at Colorado Springs in 1960.

Mr. Thompson also served at Philmont National Scout Range in 1955 and was on the Scout Exec. Bd. from 1947 to 1967 and was chairman of the Leadership Training Comm.

Besides the Lamb Award he has earned the Scoutmaster Key in 1945; the Silver Beaver in 1946; was the first one to receive the Wood Badge Award in Racine; and 23 training awards. He is a virgin member of the Order of the Arrow.
